Welcome to the Tri-Faith Initiative! As the official newcomer to the neighborhood, Countryside will be hosting the **Tri-Faith Picnic** this year. The date is **Sunday, August 16, at 12:30 p.m.** We will have a big tent and lots of food and entertainment for kids and adults! So Please **Save the Date** on your calendars to spend the afternoon celebrating with our new neighbors!

As a new participant of the Tri-Faith, many of our Countryside members have been asking me about some of the social courtesies we can extend toward our brothers and sisters at the temple and the mosque. This Tri Faith Picnic is a great way to begin those discussions about things like food restrictions that are different for each faith tradition and their cultures.

Last year, during our discernment period, I interviewed some of the Tri-Faith leaders and asked them about the nature of being neighbors. Within these interviews was a

conversation about food restrictions and how we Christians might be considerate of our neighbors when hosting meals for the whole Tri-Faith community. Nuzhat Mahmood, from the American Muslim Institute, answered the question with this:

“As a gesture of friendliness or neighborliness, what some groups have done over the years is, on the food table, they might put a little sticker that says ‘this item has pork in it’, just so we know, as we are going along, we are going to skip this one. And when we say pork, it might be gelatin, like a Jell-O salad that has gelatin in it, which we don’t eat because it is made usually of swine or pig bones. That would help as we are going down the line, and it helps us not hold up the line because we are standing there going ‘oh my gosh what is this or what isn’t this.’”

She continued, “The main restriction really is swine. The challenge is just to know that prosciutto is made from pigs. That bacon is made from pigs. That ham is pork. Because I have honestly had people say, ‘It’s not pork, It’s ham!’ Most folks at Countryside probably know this, but the more people get away from farms and ranches, people don’t always know where their food comes from. Things like pepperoni and all those versions of sausage and bacon originate in the pig. And then likewise pig bones, which is what goes into gelatin, and then Jell-O and marshmallows, which are made from that. Gelatin is what helps marshmallows come together and be sticky. Gelatin is also used in low-fat versions of dairy products like yogurt. If you use yogurt in your recipes, it is better to use the *Dannon* brand that uses beef gelatin, or just stay away from low-fat versions of dairy.”

The term *Halal* is often used when talking about food restrictions for Muslims. Most often this is spoken of in terms of meat preparation. Muslims do not eat pork in any form, but beef also needs to be prepared in a specific way. To be truly “Halal Beef” the animal must be slaughtered specifically by a Person of the Book and in the name of Allah, and the animal must be left to hang for a period of time to drain all the blood from its body before it is prepared, since blood itself is one of the major restrictions. Our Jewish neighbors do not eat pork either, nor do they eat shellfish, because shellfish do not have fins or scales, and only those creatures who live in the water that have fins and scales are considered Kosher. So, for hosting the Tri-Faith Picnic this year, please keep these restrictions in mind. Grilled Halal Beef Burgers, Kosher Hot dogs, and cool drinks and water will be provided, while the rest of the food is up to you. We are asking for a variety of potluck dishes; to share with everyone. You might choose to stay away from Pork (not even bacon in the salads, please!), Gelatin or Shellfish altogether in your shared dishes, but if you do use any of these, please list the ingredients of your recipe on your dish so our volunteers might make signs for our guests.

As we gather with our neighbors, perhaps ask them about their dietary customs and how they follow them in their faith traditions. It will be a great way to learn from one another, and show our neighbors that who they are matters to us.

Hope to see you all in August!

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN OUTREACH

In July, the BOX continues our support of our partner **Countryside Community Cupboard**. In past years, we have supported Cupboard clients as they started the school year by providing school supplies. This year, we are helping with a different fundamental need: **socks and underwear**. With your help, we can equip students for the school year by providing these foundational garments which allow them to feel that they are like everyone else. Children of poverty do not wear underwear because it is what does not show, so it is what is left out for clothing economy. Adults may not notice, but other kids do, especially in the restrooms, locker rooms, etc. These boys and girls are embarrassed, and it prevents them from full participation in school life and activities. Underwear would help immensely for their dignity.

While it may seem early, we hope you will keep these items in mind as you are shopping and possibly planning for school shopping. **We are looking for new underwear and socks of all sizes for boys and girls and of all ages.** The items will be provided to the Countryside Cupboard volunteers for distribution at an upcoming pantry distribution. This is another chance for us to support our Cupboard partners as part of their outreach to our community. Thank you for your continued support of the **BOX** and of the **Countryside Cupboard**.

May follow up: Thank you for your support of the Countryside Cupboard and their requested high-need items. In addition to a combined total of 40 packages of feminine hygiene products, 38 deodorants and 50 tubes of toothpaste, you donated 220 toothbrushes and 18 bottles of shampoo and conditioner, as well as soaps, lotions, brushes and bandages. These items will be distributed at an upcoming Cupboard event. Thank you!

The Conference Needs Us

At the recent Annual Gathering of The Nebraska Conference of The United Church of Christ, the importance of our full participation in the conference life was reinforced.

The majority of the Nebraska UCC congregations are in smaller communities. As the population in these towns continues to shrink and age, churches do also. Fifty years ago, a part-time lay pastor was a rarity in the UCC. Today almost half of Nebraska congregations are served in this manner. As an example, a young mother in the Sandhills is serving as the lay pastor to three different UCC churches in three different towns. In two of these towns, this is the only church. She is the only staff member and is paid at a part-time rate. As you consider all she has to juggle; three budgets, three bulletins, three sets of meetings, etc., stop to think about just getting to all three churches every Sunday morning on Sandhills roads in all weather. Her only real support as a pastor is through the conference office. Every budget year we eye the OCWM line item with a red pencil in hand and some years we have reduced our giving. Our Church's Wider Mission is how we support our fellow Nebraska congregations. Other ways we could help include becoming a 5 for 5 church, which are five annual free will offerings to benefit UCC needs. Many of these struggling churches participate, but we do not. There are more needs in the world than any church can fund, but I urge you to remember our denominational needs.

You, as a congregation, would have been proud to hear the cheers and applause that greeted the update about our Tri-Faith participation. The emotional support given to our church was heartfelt, truly wonderful. There is real pride in this happening within the Nebraska Conference.



TRI-FAITH UPDATE

The Countryside Church Council has accepted the appointment of the Tri-Faith Coordinating Committee (TFCC) to spearhead the implementation of the church's decision to move to the Tri-Faith Campus. This group will function, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit and our lay leadership, until the process is complete.

The Countryside Tri-Faith Advisory Committee (TFAC), made up of those responsible for leading the Visioning & Conceptual Planning Report, interviewed 2 firms and recommended to Church Council that we hire Project Advocates to help us through the project management process of building a new church.

A presentation was made to Church Council which shared the history of our extensive selection process for hiring Alley Poyner Macchietto (APM) of Omaha and Hammel, Green and Abrahamson (HGA) of Minneapolis to do our Visioning Process earlier this year. A motion was presented and accepted by Church Council to request a proposal from APM and HGA and enter into contract negotiations for architectural services to complete the design of our new building. The proposal to the firms includes several steps, one of which is the production of three design options for our discussion and possible approval. The Tri-Faith Coordinating Committee will keep the Church Council informed and final approval will be required prior to beginning construction.

The process of acquiring the land for our building is underway and the Church Council and congregation will be given a progress report.

Joyce Davis has agreed to serve as Countryside's representative on the Tri-Faith Initiative Board's Communications Committee. That committee is responsible for the dissemination of information through various media and among the three faith communities.


