

WORSHIP

We would like to thank Rebecca Morello and Don Sarton for their time and words of wisdom over these past few weeks. We are blessed to have talented and spirit-filled people on staff and in our congregation.

The next sermon series will be focusing on two of our discernment questions (see page 7 for information about our upcoming discernment).

How do we want to be challenged spiritually and intellectually? What is our call to serve?

Starting in September we will be following subjects to learn about the United Church of Christ under their Justice & Local Ministries information. Justice & Local Church Ministries of the United Church of Christ supports congregations and other settings of the church in doing justice, seeking peace, and building vibrant faith communities that are welcoming to all. The ministries and services of Justice and Local Church Ministries are central to the identity of the United Church of Christ.

Specifically we will be focusing on:

Racial Justice (anti-racism) - building healthier environments, communities, and social spaces in order to address stigma, health disparities, and human rights issues.

Immigration - The United Church of Christ has a long history of solidarity in the struggle for dignity and human rights for immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees regardless of their immigration status. We do this through a network of grassroots leaders in the UCC National Collaborative on Immigration (sign up here) working to share a prophetic stance and lift up the voices of impacted leaders.

LGBTQ (ONA - Open And Affirming) - Open and Affirming is a journey of building inclusive churches and other ministry settings that welcome the full participation of LGBT people in the UCC's life and ministry.

Disabilities (A2A - Accessible to All) and Mental Health - God calls us to create a just world for all people living with disabilities. God calls us to the work of justice for people experiencing

stigma, invisibility, and marginalization by church and society. We are called to work to ensure that church and society reduces the stigma faced by those living with disabilities and makes room at the table through education, advocacy and partnerships

Addiction -

As people seeking God's healing and justice, with the understanding of addiction as the result of social sin, we can understand that addiction recovery requires community resilience and political advocacy. Advocating for the end of discrimination in the form of racism, homophobia, transphobia, ableism, sexism and socioeconomic insecurity can strengthen communities and help prevent addiction.

Creation Justice (Climate Change) - As one of the UCC's eight Just World Covenant programs, Creation Justice Churches guide congregations in discerning how they can best embody a commitment to care for God's creation.

We are planning on having talk back sessions after the 11 AM service after each of these subjects so keep an eye on the newsletter and C-10 for more information to come.

THE BOX FOR AUGUST

The Box for August is Partnership 4 Hope. Partnership 4 Hope (specifically their Youth Mart) is a community-based initiative designed to address the unique challenges that Young Adult Former Foster Youths face. The community and population it serves are young adults in the greater Omaha metropolitan area, nineteen years of age and older, who have "aged out" of the foster care system. The Youth Mart is a donation center that serves former foster youth ages 16 to 24 as they face the transition into living independently with little support from family. Young adults are allowed to shop free of charge at the Youth Mart for household essentials, furniture and personal care items. Items being collected include young men and womens clothing, small household appliances, pots and pans, self-care items including toiletries and feminine products.

DISCERNMENT STARTS IN SEPTEMBER - WE NEED YOU!

Discernment is a word christians often use instead of "making a decision" or "picking a choice," although it means more than that. Discerning means making the choice to pray and ask where God is leading you. Discernment is the willingness to take the next step. Taking time to pray over a decision is critical for larger, important decisions, like how do we serve? Who do we want to be? In these situations we want to ask God and listen for answers.

The church council, during their retreat at the end of July, examined what questions Countryside Community Church needs to ask itself as we move forward and look for settled ministers. Three key questions came to the front.

As a church community, in light of our mission statement: (see sidebar for mission statement).

- 1. How do we want to be challenged spiritually and intellectually?
- 2. What is our call to serve?
- 3. What does it mean to be the Christian partner of the Tri-Faith Initiative?

To answer these questions, it is going to take a church-wide effort. We are going to move into a time of discernment starting in September. To get the conversations started we will be offering **small group meetings**. These will be done in homes, on Zoom and at the church. They will be made up of 6-12 church members who, together, will meet and talk about their hopes and prayers for Countryside as well as answer these three questions. Registration for these small groups will begin in September.

Learning/listening sessions are another component of our discernment process. These will be opportunities to learn about the United Church of Christ, our leadership model and more about the United Church of Christ search and call process.

Congregational information meetings will be used as another opportunity to get involved and also to provide feedback from the small groups. Here is where you will receive updates and share in the search and call process for settled ministers.

Lastly, we will provided feedback opportunities to respond to the output of our small groups and to allow for the most common themes to come to the surface.

What can you do to get involved in the discernment process as we begin?

- Sign up to be part of a small group starting in September (countrysideucc.org/register).
- Participate in the all church meetings, such as the learning/listening sessions and congregational information meetings.
- **Speak up**. Countryside Community Church is **YOUR** church. We want to hear from as many of you as possible.
- **Pray.** During this time of discernment it is important that we pray about what is ahead for us. No one, at the moment, has it all figured out. Discernment calls for honesty, trust, prayerful attentiveness, a willingness to let go of self, and respect among all who are involved.

We are currently looking for church members to help us **facilitate** during our discernment process. This would mostly be done in the small group setting. If you are interested in being a facilitator, please contact Diane Scott at dianes@countrysideucc.org. Jan Brown will be training facilitators to lead the small group sessions at the end of August.

We also need people who are willing to host small groups in their homes and people to take notes during these sessions, to free up the facilitators to focus on that job. For these opportunities please go to countrysideucc.org/register and you can volunteer to host or scribe through a link on that page.

We look forward to entering this conversation with you and to listening to the response of the Spirit of God within us and among us.

Please continue to come to church, read your **weekly C-10 emails** and our **church newsletter** to learn about discernment opportunities and how you can get involved. We will also have a space on our **website** where we will place all the information on discernment as it happens, **countrysideucc.org/discernment**. We can't do this without **YOU**.
