YOUTH MISSION TRIP

Our senior high is headed to St.Louis!

From July 8 to 15 we will spend time connecting with and serving St.Louis. The youth group will be working directly with SEED St.Louis, an organization with a mission to address food security and sustainability throughout the city's region. This non-profit was born in 1984 aiming to connect people to healthy food and the land around them. SEED has several programs with goals of providing communities with education, resources, and a network of people. When our group joins them, we plan to provide them support with ongoing work and any projects that require a large group of people. We will have the opportunity to volunteer in both community and school gardens. Most mornings we will spend a few hours with SEED to provide general garden maintenance and care, produce care and harvesting. Along with our physical support, BOCO has assigned the June Box to gather resources for SEED, that we will deliver to the organization. Our students have spent this school year deepening their understanding of the importance of community, community gardens and food sustainability. With that, we have worked together to learn more about those systems and needs in Omaha and St.Louis specifically. It's been great to learn how every community is unique in its needs and resources. Along with our garden work and education with SEED, we will do a lot of wonderful activities.

On Sunday we will join a UCC church for their Sunday morning worship service. We look forward to experiencing how another UCC church celebrates Christianity. Along with our time with SEED, we will go to the National Blues Museum and the Laumeier Sculpture Park. We also plan to scope out some fun local food and dessert shops to check out. We will spend time nourishing our relationships with ourselves and our group internally as well. We will spend Sunday talking about what a true Sabbath is and we will recognize the Sabbath on Sunday and spend time resting together and individually. We will watch Youth VS the Government one night and share our thoughts, and spend an evening or two together playing games, watching TV, and reading. The students are also looking forward to bringing recipes and cooking for the group for various meals. Because we will be returning on July 15, the students have decided to have a lock-in and all go to the Heartland Pride Parade together on the July 16!

Reconstructing Ethnicity: The Process of Assimilation for Latinx Jewish Immigrants in the United States with Dr. Laura Limonic

In this special session of Abraham's Whiteboard, guest host Dr. Laura Limonic will discuss Jewishness, race, ethnicity, and immigration through the stories of Latinx Jews in the United States. She will explore how ethno-religious identity is constructed for new immigrants in the United States by asking key questions such as: How do Latinx Jews identify? Can they choose their identity or is it assigned to them? Is ethnicity strategic or instrumental? Drawing on the experiences of Latinx Jewish immigrants, the historical roots of Jewish migration streams to Latin America and the United States and a sociological comparative perspective, Limonic will discuss how group construction is never static, and, in particular, how race, religion, and class interact in the immigrant assimilation process.

Laura Limonic is an Associate Professor of Sociology at the College of Old Westbury of the State University of New York. Her research is in the area of contemporary immigration to the United States and the integration trajectories of ethnic and ethno-religious groups.

Abraham's Whiteboard is a monthly educational class led by Tri-Faith's Education Director, Jeremy Fricke, on a wide variety of special topics, historical moments, and world religions. All Abraham's Whiteboard sessions are open to all people regardless of background, but will connect the content to Judaism, Christianity, and/or Islam.
