FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK - CANOEING THE MOUNTAINS

We live in the land that launched the expedition of Lewis and Clark. The Corps of Discovery launched from St. Charles and headed up the Missouri River. At the direction of President Thomas Jefferson, Lewis and Clark were commissioned to travel up the Missouri River and find the water route across the country for the purposes of commerce. Jefferson understood that whoever controlled the waters controlled the land. So they traveled upstream on the Missouri River for 15 months until they came to the spine of the continent at Lemhi Pass where Montana meets Idaho, where the head waters of the Missouri River were found as a spring. The discoverers expected to cross over the pass to join the head waters of the Columbia River which would lead them to the Pacific. They imagined with glee that the canoes they carried would be used to float downstream to the Pacific and what did they discover? From atop Lemhi Pass, they were shocked to find mountain range after mountain range, nothing but snow-covered mountain tops. It was 300 miles of 14,000 foot plus mountains as far west as the eye could see. Those canoes? What they needed were pack animals.

Like them, we have left the map and are in uncharted territory. We are experienced river rafters who must now learn to be mountaineers. The story of the Corps of Discovery is the driving metaphor for our present moment. In every field, every business, every organization, leaders are rapidly coming to the awareness the world in front of us is radically different from everything behind us. In the words of futurist Bob Johansen, "after centuries of stability and slow, incremental change, in less than a generation our world has become volatile, uncertain, complex and ambiguous." This world will only become more so in the days ahead and will require all leaders to learn new skills.

Countryside is standing atop the Lemhi Pass. Will we turn around and take our canoes back downstream, reversing from the challenge of the future? Or will we drop our canoes and make Recharge...4 snowshoes to accept the challenge of the future? We have a new pastor coming and with her or him will be a new wind of the Spirit. Will we trim our sails for the new directions we will be challenged to take?
