From the Desk of Rev. Chris Alexander | Associate Minister

One of the things that strikes me when I meet with folks from the Tri-Faith Initiative is how much easier it seems to talk to our Jewish and Muslim brothers and sisters than it is to talk to some of our Christian brothers and sisters. It seems counterintuitive, doesn't it? One would think, because of our common language and sacred texts, that it would be easier to talk to Christians, since there would be so many common assumptions within our conversations. But I suppose it's more about the topics we talk about that makes the conversations difficult. When it comes to things like poverty, malnutrition, and even education (for the most part), these are issues that span both the ecumenical and the interfaith traditions, so they are easy to get behind and build partnerships around and collaborate in our actions together within the community.

But when it comes to civil liberty issues like gender, race, and sexual orientation, or environmental issues, or issues of leadership and polity, it is much harder to find common ground for conversation. And in my experience, it's harder to find common ground within the Christian tradition on these issues than it is with the progressive Jews and Muslims with whom we partner within the Tri-Faith Initiative.

Why is that? What is it about us Christians that we have such a broad spectrum of understanding about what it means to follow Jesus? That's exactly the question posed by Bill Sellgren, one of the members of the Adult Education team, last February. He brought this question to Kelly Keller and myself and asked if maybe we could put a class together around this issue, bringing folks together from other Christian denominations that might help us better understand some of the differences between us. So we did.

The class is called *What Brings You Joy? Conversations Across The Christian Spectrum*. It will meet on *Wednesday evenings during the month of June, beginning at 6:30p.m. in (ironically) the Common Grounds Coffee House at Countryside.* We have asked representatives from the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME), the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), The Catholic Church, and the Evangelical Traditions, to join Dr. Elnes and me, from the UCC perspective, in conversation around some key themes. Topics for discussion include worship traditions and practices, the private and the public faith of each tradition, the person of Jesus, and thoughts around salvation and eternal life. Each of the traditions will have a chance to speak to each of these themes from their own experience, and then we will open the discussion to the community for a question and answer period.

So bring your own faith backgrounds and any questions you might have for others, to be a part of the discussion. It's a fabulous opportunity to learn about other Christian traditions. And in our new role as the primary Christian representative at the Tri-Faith campus, we will need this information, since we will no doubt be asked about this broad spectrum of understanding within Christianity by our interfaith partners and the larger Omaha community!

Hope to see you there.

Children of poverty do not wear underwear because it is what does not show, so it is what is left out for clothing economy. Adults may not notice, but other kids do, especially in the restrooms, locker rooms, etc. These boys and girls are embarrassed, and it prevents them from full participation in school life and activities. Underwear would help immensely for their dignity.

While it may seem early, we hope you will keep these items in mind as you are shopping and possibly planning for school shopping. We are looking for new underwear and socks of all sizes for boys and girls of all ages. The items will be provided to the Community Cupboard volunteers for distribution at an upcoming pantry distribution. This is another chance for us to support our Cupboard partners as part of their outreach to our community. Thank you for your continued support of the BOX and of the Community Cupboard.

April follow up: Thank you for your support of COuntryside YOuth (COYO) and their upcoming mission trip. Your donations to the BOX resulted in 23 over-the-counter pain medications and creams, 11 bottles of vitamins and numerous school supplies, including nearly 175 pens and 175 pencils, 150 crayons and 25 glue sticks. These items will be distributed by COYO to the orphanages and infirmaries they visit on their trip to Dionne's Children's Home in Bamboo, Jamaica. Thank you!

The Board of Christian Outreach (BOCO) thanks you for your generous support of our outreach efforts through the 2014 Christmas and 2015 Easter offerings. TRI-FAITH UPDATE

On April 12, 2015 at a special congregational meeting, Countryside Community Church voted to become the Christian partner in the Tri-Faith initiative and move Countryside to the campus at 132nd and Pacific Streets. In response to this vote and a directive from the Church Council, the Tri-Faith Coordinating Committee was tasked with moving forward with the selection of an architectural firm that will help us with the design of our new church. All of the input from the Visioning Process will be used in the conceptualization phase of this exciting project.

The Tri-Faith Coordinating Committee has met twice in May and discussed possible avenues to pursue with determining an architect to design Countryside Community Church. Once the Architect is selected, they will provide us, as part of the Pre-Design, a determination of project requirements and schedule relative to the conceptual diagrams we have in the report presented to the congregation. From there, Schematic Design is the next phase – including the development of alternative concepts of design options.

In addition, by directive of the Church Council, new committees will be formed along the way and at various phases of this 3-5 year project. This will allow us to concentrate on specific aspects of the design and implementation first. As has been done in the past, the congregation will be given regular updates on the progress being made in worship services, the newsletter, C-10 and the church bulletin.

The Tri-Faith Coordinating Committee is excited about entering this new phase and making this next chapter in the Countryside Community Church story a reality. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact moderator@countrysideucc.org.




