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SUNDAY WORSHIP AND STAFF UPDATES

COVID-19 CASES REMAIN IN HIGH RISK, WORSHIP REMAINS ONLINE

Countryside continues in the RED phase of the Countryside Worship Guidelines reopening set forth by the Countryside Re-Start Task Force and the Church Council. The church does not move to the next phase (ORANGE) until new cases are below 200 for two consecutive weeks. As of the printing of this newsletter, cases had jumped to 844 the week ending September 28. UPDATE FROM TLC (TRANSITION LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE)

On September 2, Countryside announced the resignation of our senior minister, Rev. Dr. Eric Elnes. The Church Council has established a Transition Leadership Committee (TLC), which has already begun meeting and working with the UCC to consider options and identify procedures and processes. The committee has interviewed key staff members, and has begun to collect data to update and post Countryside's church profile with the UCC. The profile was partially updated during the discernment process to consider becoming the Christian partner of the Tri-Faith Initiative. Other parts of the profile have not been updated since Eric came 12 years ago. We have asked many boards and congregation members for input and help to complete the profile, which will be filed with the UCC for review by interested candidates.

There are many options available to Countryside during our interim period. The traditional path involves an Interim Minister position, which can take on many forms. We are exploring each variation of this, in addition to a number of hybrid models that are successful around the country. The TLC team is also discussing models that do not follow the traditional path of Interim Minister position, and carefully weighing the benefits of each with regard to what best fits Countryside, both in our current and future planning structures. As our work continues, we will share updates that provide more detail on this interim process. A good interim period will prepare us for the future, and lead us to be both excited and ready for our future leadership and ministry that Spirit is calling us to.

In addition, the committee will consider both the budget impact and personnel impact of each option. The TLC team is committed to providing regular updates to Church Council and to the congregation. Please know how we appreciate you and miss seeing your faces:

From Rev. Dr. Eric Elnes: It has been said that a community's true colors show most clearly not during times of ease, but of difficulty. In this respect, Countryside's colors have shown brilliantly during the global pandemic. I deeply appreciate how caring and compassionate the congregation has been, not only to fellow members and the wider community, but to us as staff. We have experienced Countryside's care in a wide variety of ways, not the least of which is its commitment to holding services and meetings online/on-air until there is an abundance of assurance that we can safely reoccupy the church. Speaking most personally, I have also been deeply moved by the overwhelming support that Melanie and I have received since announcing my upcoming transition, even through the tears we've shed together. Countryside members do more than just believe that we are all loved beyond our wildest imagination. They continually demonstrate their beliefs through acts of kindness and generosity - even during difficult times. I could hardly be prouder to have served Countryside for nearly 13 years. From Alex Ritter: The music staff and I are grateful for the time we had last year - the concerts, rehearsals, services, and time spent together before the pandemic. Though we had to cut the program year short, we were able to partake in some unique and interesting experiences, nevertheless. To all of our singers and instrumentalists who spent countless hours in rehearsals, practicing, and sharing their gifts with our church and local community, and to all of our volunteers and parents who help make it all happen: a big thank you from all of us at Countryside! From Jan Brown: Not being able to visit you at home, in the hospital or in care facilities has been difficult and lonely for me. When I start to grieve these missed opportunities to be with you in person, I remember all the ways you care for each other, and always have. Phone calls, emails, texts, prayer groups, Zoom meetings for adult and youth gatherings, and sometimes even socially-distanced visits - you find a way, Countryside. Not only do you continually reach out toward one another, but you also do that for me. "How are YOU doing, Jan?" - This question brings a smile to my face. You are trustworthy friends to me and to one another. A global pandemic only confirms this for me. Thank you, Countryside.




SERVE ON A COUNTRYSIDE BOARD

Henrietta Lacks was 31

and a mother of five children when she died at Baltimore's Johns Hopkins hospital of cervical cancer in 1951. Without the family's knowledge, doctors there took a sample of her malignant tissues as part of their search for a line of cells that were able to survive and reproduce outside the body, and so make possible medical experiments they were not able to perform on living bodies. Henrietta's cells proved to be the ones, and – by forming the springboard for new treatments for diseases such as TB, flu, herpes, Aids and for the development of chemotherapy – changed the face of medicine forever.

LET'S CELEBRATE REV. DR. ERIC ELNES!



COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION SURVEY

SURVEY RESPONSES

There is no substitute for gathering in person. We all miss our Sunday morning hugs and greetings, coffee in Common Grounds and inspirational messages in the Sanctuary. But in true Countryside style, our congregation has come together in an optimistic and thoughtful way by continuing to gather virtually while appreciating and respecting the limitations of the pandemic. The survey regarding online church participation sent to all church members at the end of August reflects the insight and depth of the congregation regarding the church's response to the pandemic.

There were 165 individual responses to the survey. Most of the people (83%) who responded attended church either once a month or several times a month before the pandemic and similarly (with a slight drop to 74%) continue to watch online or on television with a majority switching back and forth between online and television when they watched.

Convenience was cited by most respondents as the best thing about watching from home. Convenience was also important in having the flexibility to watch or re-watch the service on YouTube at a time that worked for them.

Many respondents also commented on the technical and production value: "I've seen a high level of creativity, and the technical execution is generally very good. I really appreciate the church's willingness to experiment and try to connect with people in different ways."

Regarding other Sunday morning activities, many responded that they have participated in the pre-worship meditation (46%), coffee hour (44%) and book discussion groups (25%). Other activities (not on Sunday mornings) drew the most people to concert series (46%), boards and committees (41%), small groups (33%) and book discussions (23%). Going forward into fall, most are interested in connecting through small group fellowship, spiritual enrichment and musical offerings.


Those who haven't connected online largely haven't made it a priority, "Just haven't connected or prioritized for me. The effort being made is excellent on the part of planning staff. Wasn't really connected in this way when attending at the church site." "If I'm not connecting, it's because I'm burnt out on video chatting. It's far less satisfying (than) real, live people."

People are most grateful to Countryside for continuing to provide ways to gather virtually. "Being responsible. Knowing that I would be responded to if needed" and the fact that Countryside "Paid attention to the danger of large group gatherings and came up with a formula for when it is safe to return in person to worship." People also expressed gratitude to Countryside for its attention to the food pantry and racial discrimination, the Tri-Faith Initiative, a mixture of ways to connect and online church services.






How easy has it been for you to connect with these online events or groups via Zoom?


SURVEY RESPONSES TO PANDEMIC





STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN FALL 2020

Hello Countryside Members and Friends,

Since the onset of the pandemic, our clergy, staff, and lay leadership have been working diligently to wisely manage our resources, ensuring we retain as much staff as possible while adjusting to meet the needs and priorities of our congregation in these unusual times.

To help, we applied for and received the Payment Protection Plan Loan (PPP) provided by the Cares Act. The PPP funds are restricted to payroll and other unanticipated expenses directly associated with COVID19 and have strict accounting and reporting requirements. As the CARES Act allows, we are seeking loan forgiveness, which, if approved, would convert the PPP Loan to a grant and alleviate repayment.

2019 was a significant year for Countryside. We relocated to the Tri-Faith Commons to be in relationship with our faith partners, Temple Israel and the American Muslim Institute; and we opened a beautiful new church. With these initiatives, we anticipated our reach in 2020 would increase along with our attendance and membership. And we were well on our way when the pandemic arrived, and our world changed.

In the face of theses extraordinary circumstances, Countrysiders came together, stood up, and went to work. From streaming worship services to creating text prayer groups and calling networks to establishing a safe plan for re-opening, we put our faith into action to meet the physical, financial, and spiritual needs of our members, friends, and people throughout the Omaha community.

This global event has changed our circumstances, just as it has for so many of us, creating new opportunities and new challenges, including adding financial stress. As we look forward to 2021, the Board of Trustees and the budget committee is approaching the 2021 budget conservatively and with great fiscal constraint. Even with our best effort, the Board of Trustees anticipates a 10 to 15% increase in giving is needed to help balance our budget in uncertain times.

It is in this spirit that Countryside's Stewardship Committee announces the 2021 Stewardship Campaign, Together We Make a Difference—Rise Up 2021. We believe our theme is as relevant as it is timely; designed to reflect these unprecedented times in which we find ourselves and inspire us to right action that aligns with our commitment to work together to promote peace and justice in our conflicted world.

Even though we can't meet in person, our ministries are more relevant and necessary today than ever before. Your continued participation, service, and support ensures our programs rise up to meet the needs of our congregation and community now and into the future. We humbly ask you to make or renew your financial pledge to Countryside Community Church for the 2021 calendar year.


