DR. ANNA CREWS CAMPHOUSE JOINS COUNTRYSIDE



WORSHIP REMAINS ONLINE AND ON KMTV 3

We are still in the RED phase of our opening guidelines. When the new cases are under 500 for two consecutive weeks we will start in-person services at 25% occupancy. There will be one service and it will be by reservation only, masks will be required, seating will be in designated areas only, socially distancing of 6 feet will be in effect and there will be no fellowship gathering. For a detailed explanation of our five-phase approach you can check the website at countrysideucc.org/covid19. The guidelines are reviewed on a monthly basis at Church Council meetings.

APRIL WORSHIP SERIES

Our Denomination, the United Church of Christ (UCC), came into being in 1957, from the merger of the Evangelical and Reformed churches and the Congregational Christian churches. The UCC is a progressive Christian denomination with a long history of supporting justice. It was the first mainline Christian denomination to ordain an African American minister (1785), a woman minister (1853), and an openly homosexual minister (1972)

The UCC motto, "That they may all be one," speaks to the hope that one day all denominations, will either come together as one, and respect one another.



The UCC slogans, "God is still speaking," and "Never place a period where God has placed a comma," (a quote from comedian and Catholic Gracie Allen) demonstrate an understanding of the continuing unfolding of God's revelation. And the UCC statement, "No matter who you are or

where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here," shows that our denomination believes in extravagant hospitality.

In 2017 the UCC announced a new logo at the 2017 General Synod. The new logo's colors were chosen to work with both 'A Just World for All' and the '3 Great Loves campaign — Love of Children, Love of Neighbor, Love of Creation.' Blue has replaced red to visually and symbolically represent Creation elements of water and earth.

COURAGEOUS HOPE VIA "THE MOODY BLUES" FROM JAN BROWN, PASTORAL CARE COORDINATOR

Isn't it a good thing that none of us can see into the future? One year ago we were all thinking that the virus would dissipate by summer 2020. Or maybe by fall. But it's now been 13 months of this alternate reality, and many of us are fraying. With the hope of the vaccine, we dare to believe that life will return in its fullness and that we shall once again gather in larger groups at church and in our own personal lives. But there has been some fallout. Please read from the following two links which I've found helpful. And remember that we are a caring church family. Contact me if you want to talk or possibly be assigned a Stephen Minister. One of the most dangerous secrets to keep is depression, and there is help as long as we know that it's needed.

Anxiety and Depression Symptoms Have Risen Dramatically During the Pandemic | Psychology Today, Key Points:

1. During one week in June 2020, 9,896 adults age 18 years and older were invited to participate in a web-based survey; 5412 (55%) responded. Standardized self-reported screening instruments were used to assess symptoms of anxiety, depressive disorders, and trauma- or stress-related disorders (TSRD) as a result of the pandemic.
2. Overall, about 26% of participants demonstrated symptoms of anxiety, 24% symptoms of depression, and 26% symptoms of TSRD. About 41% had symptoms suggestive of at least one of these groups of symptoms. The authors estimate that these rates are three to four times higher than those reported in similar surveys one year earlier.
3. The authors found interesting trends related to age, race/ethnicity, income, type of employment, and employment status. Young adults were much more likely to report symptoms than older individuals: 75% of those 18-24 years of age reported symptoms of anxiety, depressive disorder, and/or TSRD. This decreased to 52% in those 25-44, 30% in those 45-64, and 15% in those 65 and older.
4. The data in this survey demonstrate that the mental health consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic are dramatic. Over 40% of individuals reported significant symptoms of anxiety, depression, or TSRD. Young adults appear to be particularly susceptible. About 75% of 18- to 24-year-olds reported such symptoms, and over 25% had seriously considered taking their own lives. The elderly appear more resilient with fewer than 15% reporting symptoms and 2% reporting seriously considering suicide.
5. Equally important, everyone should be aware of the impact this pandemic is having on the mental state of those around them, particularly young adults. Reasons for the elevated rates of symptoms including suicidal thoughts in young adults are not certain, but likely reflect multiple personal, economic, and societal factors. The importance of maintaining social ties cannot be overemphasized. Touching base with family, friends, and neighbors can make a difference. Such relationships are important during this acute phase of the pandemic and will remain important long after the virus is tamed by vaccines and better treatments.

Suggestions for Action and Hope: How to fight depression and anxiety during the coronavirus pandemic (cnet.com), Key Points:

Limit the amount of information you consume. Set a limit of 30 minutes for news and social media combined each day, as well as challenging yourself to take two full days each week with no news or social media.

Focus on the things you can control: mask up, avoid sick people and crowds until vaccinations are the norm, avoid nonessential travel, keep your immune system strong by eating a healthy diet, and try to get enough sleep.

Stay busy with other things. This is a classic tactic for keeping anxiety under control. While you should definitely honor your feelings (more on that in the next tip), try not to allow your thoughts to spiral out of control. Focus on your daily obligations and add in fun activities to your days to keep anxiety to a minimum. Here are a few examples of simple, distracting activities you can try:

- Solve a puzzle or play a board game with your family
- Draw, paint, knit or do something else creative
- Try to bake a masterpiece dessert with ingredients you already have in your kitchen
- Read your favorite novel or watch your favorite movie
- Call someone you love and talk about things other than the coronavirus

Give yourself time to worry. Set a timer for three minutes for worry journaling, Once this is complete, shift your attention to self-care and keep your mind busy.

Vent to a friend who won't judge you. If you're more of a talker than a writer it can help to confide in a friend about how you're feeling. Talk to someone who won't judge you for the way you feel, but try to avoid talking to someone who will fuel your anxiety even further.

And from Jan: Neither of these links mention substance abuse, but they should. Although it's tempting to "self-medicate," both drugs and alcohol can act as depressants and also curb our abilities to cope in helpful ways. Also, neither link mentions prayer and meditation as ways to ease our own burdens. To trust that the Spirit of the living God is near each of us, is accessible to us, and desires relationship with us - these are profound gifts and true resources when we're troubled. If there's breath, there is hope. Please know and trust that. I'm here if you want to talk more, my friends. **Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. -Ephesians 4:2.**

MINISTER OF ENGAGEMENT AND FORMATION

During an interim period, Countryside Community Church (CCC) will be served by a Leadership Team consisting of three co-equal leaders (two ministers and one lay leader) who are called to embody and encourage the faith of the Church to live the transformative adventure of God's love. The Leadership Team (LT) is called to be a highly functioning team that is well supported and connected to an engaged congregation and Church Council. The LT is characterized by skill, synergy, creativity, collaboration, and the accomplishment of goals. Each LT member is mentored, well-supported, challenged, and accountable to the team, the Church Council, and to the congregation.

The Interim Minister of Engagement and Formation has lead responsibility for the congregation's relationship with our Tri-Faith Partners and the Tri-Faith Initiative including serving on the Tri-Faith Board. This includes the responsibility of closely aligning our ministries with the Tri-Faith vision. This person also has broad responsibility for the faith formation and engagement of our congregation - children, youth and adults. Faith formation includes congregants growing in their relationship with God, developing an understanding of the Bible and our faith tradition, deepening their spiritual life and practices, engaging in service and mission, and participating in the life and ministries of our faith community. This person will lead our Center for Faith Studies, which engages congregational members and a wider community audience. This person will periodically provide the worship service sermon utilizing the established worship team approach. We welcome Dr. Anna Crews Camphouse into this new position!

DR. ANNA CREWS CAMPHOUSE JOINS COUNTRYSIDE AS INTERIM MINISTER OF ENGAGEMENT AND FORMATION

Your Moderator Team, with Church Council's approval, is excited to announce that Reverend Dr. Anna Crews Camphouse will be joining our church as Interim Minister of Engagement and Formation on May 1, 2021. Dr. Crews Camphouse comes to Countryside from Eastern Sierra Shared Ministry in Owens Valley, California, where she is currently the Senior Pastor. Dr. Anna has over twenty years of experience in intercultural communication, community organizing, mentoring, political action, church management, and health advocacy. She has a background in ICU nursing, decades of pastoral experience, and a doctorate in pastoral care and counseling, which is a unique combination of attributes the Transition Leadership Committee (TLC) felt would help lead Countryside through the end of the pandemic and into a collective future where our heart for love of God and neighbor shine brightly.

Pastor Anna, as she prefers to be called, impressed everyone with her energy, creativity, and experience. She shared her vision for the first 100 days working within our community. Highlights of that vision included recognizing that a primary need of our congregation is working through our collective grief. When asked why this position interested her, Pastor Anna said, "The thing that gives me life, is the creativity involved in the Engagement Minister. Freedom to be me. This is the thing I like better. I don't usually get to do this because I'm [currently] in the 'senior' pastor role.... It's in my wheelhouse. This sounds like fun to get up and do in the morning." Pastor Anna has a love of small group ministry and believes that this is the best way for members to feel engaged in the congregation--especially in a large church like ours. She will also complement Dan Loven-Crum in his role as the Interim Director of Vision and Stewardship, combining his wisdom of all things Countryside with her fresh look at how we can most fully live into our partnership as the Christian presence on the Tri-Faith Commons.

Pastor Anna grew up in what she calls U.C.L.A.—the unknown corner of lower Alabama. She has spent most of her adult life in California serving churches throughout the central and southern California regions. She is passionate about social justice, climate justice, LGBTQIA+ inclusion, intercultural work, and interfaith collaboration. Anna's husband of 17 years is Rev. David Camphouse. After twenty years of pastoral ministry, David is looking to have a change of career, exploring opportunities in human resources jobs in Omaha. They have three children whom Anna has been homeschooling this year due to the pandemic. Sophia is twelve and in the 6th grade. Paul and John are identical twins who are eight years old. They are in the second grade. "It would be a great joy for my family to have the pleasure of rearing my children in a faith community that shares my values." She will be traveling to Omaha to start at Countryside on May 1 and her husband David and children will follow soon afterwards. 

VACCINE SITES GROW IN NUMBER

Opportunities to get COVID-19 vaccination are increasing as the eligible age groups expand. Beginning on Thursday, April 1, the Douglas County Health Department (DCHD) will open appointment scheduling to residents 45 years of age and up, or anyone born in 1976 or before.

No later than 9 a.m. anyone who wants to set an appointment can simply go to DCHD's homepage at www.douglas-countyhealth.com. Then look for the big blue box that reads: "Click Here." From there you simply follow the instructions to set your appointment at one of the many clinics in the county.

From the big blue box people can scroll down to a smaller box labeled "Where to Get A COVID-19 Vaccination." Click on that and you will find multiple other options.

Also opening (Thursday, April 1) is the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services Clinic at the Fort Omaha Campus of Metropolitan Community College. Options for those appointments appear on the Douglas County Health website listed above.

Another way to find current appointments available through chain pharmacies for those 16+, visit: VaccineSpotter.org/NE. From there you put in your zip code and you can choose which vaccine you prefer and which pharmacy you prefer. With this option, you need to check back frequently to find an open appointment. **Hint: Early afternoons seem to return the best results for open appointments at Hy-Vee.**
