Who We Are:

We are an inclusive, open and affirming family of faith, welcoming all to God's table of love and acceptance.

We are diverse, yet united by Christ's example.

We care for one another, support one another and challenge one another to become all that God creates us to be.

Music notes:

It would be remiss on Pride Sunday not to discuss the significant contributions that queer church musicians, have made on sacred music for centuries. A considerable number of organists are LGBT, and many serve in churches that are homophobic or where they can't live into who they are – an unfortunate reality that still exists to this day, though progress has been made. Virgil Fox (1912-1980) was organist for two decades at Riverside Church in NYC where his partner was the choir director, before becoming a concert organist. In addition to his virtuosity, his flamboyant style, glittering shoes, and colorful jackets drew large audiences. He was one of the most famous gay musicians in the world at the height of his career, alongside Liberace and Bernstein. Cameron Carpenter today carries on this legacy of performing camp and queerness through organ music on stage.

Billy Strayhorn was an incredibly influential jazz musician, composing standard for Duke Ellington's band such as "Take the A Train" and "Lush Life," which we heard last month. Strayhorn was openly gay during the Harlem Renaissance where queer culture flourished. *Lotus Blossom* was inspired by his grandmother's garden – he would visit during difficult times in his childhood, or when avoiding his alcoholic father. The song invokes introspective sophistication alongside youthful hopefulness – reflecting the garden as a safe space, perhaps a space in which to exist as his authentic self.

At a young age, Shea Diamond knew she was different. "As early as I can remember, I always identified as being a girl. It was hard work to pretend to be a gender that you're not. I should have gotten an Oscar, really. I had so much pressure on me as a child to be masculine. Even when I was the choir director for our church, my mother would still whisper in my ear that I was singing too high. Growing up trans takes a lot of guts." She ran away from home at 14, knowing she wouldn't be accepted. After three years in foster care, she became homeless. Struggling to survive and fund her transition, she robbed a store and was sentenced to ten years in a men's prison - an inhumane practice that puts trans women in significant danger. She did meet other trans women in prison and built a community through which she was able to better live into her identity - as she puts it "I was locked up, but my mind was free!" While in prison, she wrote I Am Her as a statement to the world - an anthem on behalf of anyone who has felt shunned for being who they are.
