Living an Easter Faith in a Good Friday World

Good Friday and Easter Sunday are woven together, inextricable from one another, and we're often surprised to come to terms with that inseparable relationship. One cannot be fully understood without the other. Both are impossible to know fully without the other.

A friend I've known through college and seminary and on to our lives in ministry is now teaching at Boston University in the arena of public faith exploring the realms of power where government and faith communities can hold real dialogue with one another in exploring the common good.

Not now preaching regularly, he wrote me this week and summarized the complexities of the day.[1] He raised key issues: "These events don't make sense, individually or collectively. Hatred, terrorism. Psychiatric problems. Guns, knives, bombs. On top of this, internationally there is Putin in Ukraine, al-Assad in Syria, and the Central African Republic."

Where does one stop? What do we think about Easter when this kind of violence is occurring in our midst?

Seasons: Exploring the Journey of Life

New Series a Unique Opportunity to Understand Life's Arc



Seasons is a new educational series designed to provide a comprehensive understanding of the human experience from birth to death. Drawing upon the realms of

knowledge and experience from theology, education, and the social sciences, participants will explore the human saga from birth to death.

Each week will focus on one stage of life, including childhood, adolescence, young adulthood, middle adulthood, and older adulthood. Through a multidisciplinary approach that incorporates theological and educational resources, participants will gain a comprehensive understanding of each stage.

Participants will explore how Scripture and faith describe the particular stage of life being considered, examining the ways in which God meets us wherever we are on the arc of life. This exploration will serve as a starting point for discussion themes that will be addressed during a large group discussion following the worship event.

In addition to the worship and discussion components, each week will also feature one or more age-specific workshops on Wednesday evening. All ages are encouraged to attend Wednesdays starting April 26. These workshops will provide an experiential opportunity to delve deeper into the particular stage of life being

considered that week, allowing for a more thorough understanding of the topic.

The series kicks off on April 23 with an opening worship event that explores how Scripture and faith describe the first stage of life: childhood. Following worship, there will be a large group discussion and age-specific workshops on Wednesday evenings that allow for deeper exploration of the stage being considered that week.

Throughout the series, the life of David in Hebrew Scripture will be examined as a case study for understanding the various stages of life. David's story covers all stages of life from childhood to older adulthood, providing a rich source of insight and reflection for participants.

Seasons provide an opportunity to deepen our understanding of the human experience and how God meets us throughout our journey. By drawing upon insights from various fields of study, this series aims to provide a comprehensive and integrated approach to the topic, fostering a rich and meaningful conversation among participants.

Don't miss this unique opportunity to explore the journey of life and how God and individuals connect and grow throughout its various stages.


One theme of the discussion was the importance of renovating the existing sites rather than replacing them. The group also discussed design styles and plant materials that would best suit the areas.

Living an Easter Faith in a Good Friday World

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Archbishop Rowan Williams wrote, "You only get anywhere near the truth when all the easy things to say about God are dismantled, so your image of God is no longer just a big projection of your own self-centered wish-fulfillment fantasies."

My good friend Pastor Marcus reminded me of a Good Friday sermon preached years ago by peace activist William Sloane Coffin. It was a sermon preached in the face of just these kinds of questions. In that good word, he claimed our challenge is to live an Easter faith in a Good Friday world. Good Friday needs no explanation because this is the nature of complexity and confusion. Good Friday needs no proving. It is self-evident and shockingly true. Acts of violence and use of coercive force are never in short supply to illustrate what Good Friday is about.

Just a few hours after worship had come to an end on Palm Sunday, violent hate took the lives of three innocents in a place called Shalom.

Recycling Project in Time For Earth Day

Faith and the Environment (FATE) is holding another recycling event, April 16-30, the weeks before and after Earth Day for Expandable Polystyrene (EPS) packing Styrofoam. EPS is the hard white packaging foam used to transport goods like TVs, appliances, glass items, temperature-sensitive medications and perishables. We can give it another life by sending it to Plastilite rather than the landfill. Plastilite will recycle it into new products, so save your Styrofoam to bring to the church in April! Watch upcoming C-10s for collection information. The collection site will be located on the lower

level of Countryside near the south double doors. Drop-off times are 8-4 p.m., Monday through Friday. Drive up and access the recycling container by ringing the buzzer at the outdoor entrance. You can also walk in through the main upper-level doors. REMEMBER! If it BENDS, it's not our friend! Please don't drop off flexible items like tape, labels, flexible foam, food containers, packing peanuts or foam sheets. Please be environmentally friendly by recycling your EPS! Social groups meet for the sheer joy of connecting with friends old and new. Some gather at the same location week to week, like Fellowship Arts and Music Etc. Don Sarton's extremely popular Bible Study group's current series is *Understanding Our Roots*, a 10-week study focusing on Luke's work organizing the many oral and written accounts of Jesus.

Educational small groups, like Adult Forum, meet to hear about and discuss various topics of interest. This group meets each Sunday after church service. Its most recent series focused on the history of world economics. Some small group opportunities are less structured. For example, the Impact Speaker program brings in outside experts on trending and important topics, like the impact of immigration on Nebraska's economy. Impact Speakers are presented on Recharge Wednesdays.







Pastoral Search Committee Update



During worship service on March 5, Pastoral Search Committee (PSC) Vice-Chair Mark Draper shared an update from the PSC. Here are a few highlights from that update:

The pastor profiles submitted by each

candidate provide us with in-depth insight into each of the candidates: we were also able to observe their online sermons. Those selected for initial interviews were asked the following five core questions, created in response to our congregation's input.

- 1)What is your leadership style in the work environment?
- 2)What are your thoughts on engaging family and youth?
- 3)What is your interest in social, racial, gender and environmental justice?
- 4)What does Progressive Christianity mean to you? 5)What is your understanding of the Tri-Faith Initiative?

Our Church Bylaws and the Pastoral Search and Call guide (provided by the UCC) provided a framework for the PSC to follow, charging us with the responsibility and criteria "to get this right." We are now entering the HR phase of our search, making confidentiality a priority. The PSC meets weekly in order to expedite this process. Individual committee members are also charged with other duties related to screening candidates between our meeting dates.

We are as eager as you are to determine the candidate who will appreciate and recognize the great history and traditions of Countryside

Community Church but also move us forward as a congregation. We look forward to presenting to the congregation for a vote that one candidate who has been fully vetted by the UCC Conference and the PSC.

We will continue to provide updates on the first Sunday of each month and share current information in the Countryside Currents newsletter. Thank you for your continued support, patience and understanding.



Temple Israel Welcomes Artist-in-Residence

Temple Israel is excited to announce their upcoming Artist-in-Residence Maestro Francesco Lotoro and music series, *A Concert of Lights*.

Maestro Lotoro, from the Foundation Institute of Concentrationary Musical Literature, is a pianist, composer and conductor. He's also served as a piano professor at the "Niccolò Piccinni" Music Conservatory of Bari, Italy.

For the past 30 years, Lotoro has worked to recover, study, revise, archive, record and promote thousands of works of concentrationary music. He has recovered more than 8,000 scores – often produced in a condition of deprivation of the most elementary human rights, in concentration, extermination, and civil and military imprisonment camps all over the world between 1933 to 1953.

There will be two opportunities to see Maestro Lotoro and A Concert of Lights. Both nights honor composers who created art even when finding any beauty in the world seemed impossible. **Wednesday, May 3 – 7 p.m.**, Temple Israel. Free Attendance. This evening features a Youth Education Concert. We encourage students to come with their parents for this meaningful and powerful musical experience. There will also be a discussion of these pieces and their legacy.

While all ages are welcome, we know the subject matter can be heavy and recommend this show to those in grade 7 or older and their adults.

Thursday, May 4 – 7 p.m., Temple Israel. Free Attendance. Maestro Lotoro partners with the Omaha Symphony to conduct pieces of Concentrationary music.
