Special Guests: United Theological Seminary

Dr. Molly Marshall and Dr. Munjed M. Murad

Rev. Dr. Marshall and Dr. Murad.

Rev. Dr. Marshall will deliver the sermon at morning worship service on Sunday, June 18 at 10 a.m.

Theologian Rev. Dr. Molly Marshall is president of United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities, a welcoming, ecumenical school that embraces all denominations and faith traditions on the cutting edge of progressive theological thought leadership. United trains leaders who dismantle systems of oppression, explore multifaith spirituality, and push the boundaries of knowledge.

Rev. Dr. Marshall was the first female theology professor and associate dean at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky., but she was forced out in 1994 after fundamentalists who oppose women in ministry gained control of the SBC. She then served 25 years at Central Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Kan., 16 as president, before retiring and coming to United Theological.

Rev. Dr. Marshall was the focus of the 6-part podcast series, <u>Brother Molly</u> which explores her life and ministry.

Dr. Munjed M. Murad is assistant professor of world religions and intercultural studies supported by the Johnson-Fry Endowment at United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities.



Dr. Murad is United's first full-time Muslim scholar and faculty member, and program director for the school's new Eco-Justice concentration. His research interests include Islam, Christianity, mysticism, comparative religion, and the natural environment. He holds a Master of Environmental Management degree from Yale School of the Environment, where he studied religion and ecology.

For his doctorate of theology at Harvard Divinity School, he defended a dissertation entitled "A Tale of Two Trees: Unveiling the Sacred Life of Nature in Islamic and Christian Traditions."

Get Connected!

Countryside Community Church offers many opportunities to connect with one another and the community. Read the weekly C-10 for current and expanded information on these and other groups, events, and programs.

Social groups meet for the sheer joy of connecting with friends old and new. Some gather at the same location week to week, like Fellowship Arts and Music Etc. This group meets each Friday in the Rahab for – you guessed it – activities that revolve around arts and music. Others, like the Lunch Bunch, meet once a month at various venues. A devoted small group of young Dungeons and Dragons aficionados meets each Friday evening for gameplay. On Sundays, a small group of junior high school students meets just for the joy of fun and games!

Journey Groups meet weekly to discuss and discover what our Still-speaking God calls us to do in our lives, community, and the world. In the process, we form deep relationships offering support to one another through life's journey. Journey groups meet in person, although some groups offer a hybrid Zoom option. 


Bible Study groups focus on developing and deepening our understanding of what it means to be a Christian in today's world. Some meet on a regular schedule, others for a specific period of time. Rev. Don Sarton's extremely popular Bible Study group's current series is *Understanding Our Roots*, a 10-week study focusing on Luke's work organizing the many oral and written accounts of Jesus.

Educational small groups, like Adult Forum, meet to hear about and discuss various topics of interest. This group meets each Sunday after church service. Its most recent series focused on the history of world economics. Some small group opportunities are less structured. For example, the Impact Speaker program brings in outside experts on trending and important topics, like the impact of immigration on Nebraska's economy. Impact Speakers are presented on Recharge Wednesdays.

Adult Forum Tackles New Series: How Jesus Became God

The Adult Forum's new series features Great Courses videos on the topic, "If Jesus never called himself, God, how did he become one?" Adult Forum meets Sundays, 11 a.m.-noon, in Deborah. A Zoom link is available on the church calendar, countrysideucc.org/calendar.

From Great Courses:

"The early Christian claim that Jesus of Nazareth was God completely changed the course of Western civilization. In fact, without the Christian declaration of Jesus as God, Western history as we know it would have never happened.

If Jesus had not been declared God, his followers would have remained a sect within Judaism, and the massive conversion of Gentiles, the Roman adoption of Christianity, and the subsequent unfolding of the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, the Reformation, and modernity would never have taken place. For that reason, the question of how Jesus became God is one of the most significant historical questions of Western civilization."

Great Courses favorite professor and *New York Times* best-selling author Bart D. Ehrman is one of America's most widely read scholars of early Christianity and the New Testament. At age 15, he became a bornagain fundamentalist evangelical Christian. After attending the Moody Bible Institute, he studied at Princeton Theological Seminary, which introduced him to texts and interpretations that led him to a more liberal form of Christianity. Eventually, he left the faith altogether.

Ehrman takes you deeply into the process by which the divinity of Jesus was first conceived by his followers, demonstrating how this conception was refined over time to become the core of the Christian theology that has so significantly shaped our civilization.

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to their father's flock of sheep when they saw a group of wandering traders. The brothers conspired against Joseph and decided to sell him to the traders. They stripped him of his iconic coat of many colors and threw him into a pit.

The brothers then flagged the caravan down and cut a deal for 20 pieces of silver to sell Joseph off for the slave markets in Egypt. It wasn't the death penalty they intended. But it was the price Joseph paid for their resentment of all the little acts of favoritism Rachel had given him as her late-life born favorite.

When Joseph was hauled out of the pit, his life was spared. And in that slight turn of the story, everything changed. All of us are brought into the story knowing a delicious irony that the lives of Jacob *and* the 11 brothers had been spared.




The phrase, "as fate would have it," is a robust way of observing that sometimes we twist and turn on the events that occur in our lives recognizing that sometimes they are good events and sometimes they're tragic. But on occasion, more often than we can know, even tragic events have a tendency to act positively in our regard. Isn't that how life turns for us as well?

Sometimes we make the smallest imperceptible turn and our lives are spared. A job is offered, or a job is taken away. We get a phone call and with it our lives are changed. Inexplicably our lives take a turn here, or a twist there, and the arc of our lives unpredictably shift and twist in a new direction. In this dance, it is not God's job to keep bad things from happening. They do happen: Brothers turn against brothers. People are bought and sold. Famine devastates the land.

COMMITTEE UPDATES

Pastoral Search Committee

We had high hopes that we would be announcing a candidate to you by now. Sadly, that is not the case. Recently, we finalized a candidate to put forth to the congregation to recommend for our settled senior minister. Unfortunately, this candidate subsequently withdrew their application due to personal reasons. Our committee was surprised and deeply saddened by this. We felt a little like we'd been running a marathon, but when the finish line came into view, it was abruptly moved further away.

We'd like to summarize our process so far to help you understand better where we are.

We spent the first 10-12 months of the process holding town hall-style meetings and conducting surveys to ensure your voice would be heard and included in the new church profile.

In December, we completed and posted Countryside's profile and immediately began to receive several pastor profiles.

We developed rubrics to evaluate candidates and decide if they warranted an initial interview. We developed consistent questions for these interviews. We then created questions and processes for second interviews, evaluating sermons and reference checks.

Although this whole process felt long, please remember that as of this writing, it's only been five months since our church profile was posted. Hopefully, this will help us all keep a realistic perspective.

Throughout the search process, the Pastoral Search Committee dedicated itself to identifying a candidate for our settled senior minister position the congregation would feel excited about – both in terms of enriching our spiritual journeys and in providing leadership both within this Church and outside this Church as the Christian partner in the Tri-Faith Initiative.

The Pastoral Search Committee continues to be as open with the congregation as we can be about the progress of our search process. We want you to know



we've hit a bump in the road, but the processes are solidly in place and the search will continue. The Pastoral Search Committee remains committed to the stewardship of this sacred process and steadfast in our work to identify the right settled senior minister for Countryside.

Personnel Committee

The search committee's process for finding a settled minister has been extended unexpectedly. The Personnel Committee and Countryside congregation appreciate the work they have done and will continue to do. It's a challenging task. They approached it with care, mindfulness, and diligence. One of the personnel committee's objectives is to support them in their work throughout the search process.

As such, the personnel committee met with Pastor Keith about his contract extension to support Countryside through the search and transition process. We have agreed on an extension, and Keith has affirmed his commitment to Countryside as an interim minister. We are grateful to him for his dedication to helping Countryside in this transitional process and the many gifts he brings to our congregation and staff.

Again, we want to express our gratitude to the search committee for all the hard work they have put in and will have to continue doing. Please continue to pray for wisdom and strength for our search committee members. We also want to thank Keith for his commitment to Countryside, providing stability to us as a congregation and our Tri-Faith partners throughout the search process. And we are grateful to each of you as such a supportive congregation to the church's lay leadership. Thank you for your faithful spirit and support.

On June 19, 1865, the Union Army came to Texas and announced the state's slaves were free. While the Fourth of July is traditionally our country's day to celebrate freedom, not all people were free.

Although Juneteenth has been celebrated in the African American community for hundreds of years, it only became a federal holiday in 2021. Juneteenth is a day of celebration for all Americans, for none of us are free until all of us are free.

Why Juneteenth (aka Freedom Day or Emancipation Day) Matters



Smith is also the June 7 keynote speaker for the <u>Race,</u> <u>Religion, and Social Justice Conference</u>.



Tai Chi Classes in August

The Board of Life Ministries is excited to announce a special event designed to promote spiritual health and wellness within the congregation. During August, Countrysiders will have the opportunity to participate in a 4-week Tai Chi class led by instructors Rita Otis and Sharon Royers. Recognizing the importance of accommodating busy schedules, two sessions of the Tai Chi class will be held each day. The RRSJ Conference keynote, featuring author Clint Smith (*How the Word is Passed*) will be presented as a fireside chat conversation at 7 p.m. on Wed., June 7 at Temple Israel.

Building bridges of hope and healing requires an earnest, often uncomfortable encounter with the past. Perhaps no other contemporary writer has demonstrated their ability to probe, digest, and teach this truth more clearly than Clint Smith.

His work reflectively explores the power of narratives and the broader phenomena of public memory — particularly, "how people, communities, and nations should account for the crimes of their past" ("How Germany Remembers the Holocaust," The Atlantic).

As the RRSJ 2023 keynote speaker, Smith's fireside chat will focus on the themes explored in *How the Word Is Passed*, as well as in his articles for The Atlantic. A dessert bar and a book signing session will follow the fireside chat.

For his breakout session on the morning of June 8 (Conference Day), Smith will read from his latest poetry collection, *Above Ground*, then participate in a Q&A session and another brief book signing.

The Gifts of Pentecost: Intergenerational Fellowship

The *Gifts of Pentecost* art installation is a series of acrylic-on-canvas paintings created by Countryside members and their families. It was sponsored by The Board of Arts Ministries and planned in conjunction with the Wednesday night Youth Programming.

This is the first Intergenerational Art Project to be done in our new church. The goal of this project was to promote fellowship between the adults and youth within our congregation and to create meaningful art for the Pentecost season.
