Music notes:

The "O Antiphons" are a set of seven liturgical antiphons chanted or recited during Advent in the Christian tradition. Each antiphon focuses on a different title of the Messiah, drawn from the prophecies of the Old Testament. Each verse of the hymn *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel* is one of the antiphons. We will explore each throughout Advent, including the two we sing today:

O Clavis David (O Key of David):

Drawing on the metaphor of a key, this antiphon emphasizes Christ's authority to unlock the doors of salvation. It echoes Isaiah's prophecy, portraying Christ as the key that opens the way for redemption and liberation.

O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations):

Rooted in the messianic promises in the prophecy of Isaiah, it expresses the hope for the reconciliation of all peoples and a reign of peace in the world.

Catherine Winkworth, a nineteenth century women's rights activist and education advocate, was involved with that same movement. Her focus was German music, and she translated many hymns we sing to this day. *Comfort, Comfort, Ye My People,* a versification of Isaiah 40:1-5, was paired with a French renaissance tune by Louis Bourgeois, a composer with the distinction of being jailed for altering to popular hymns in a manner not appreciated by the authorities.

The Burt Carols

Program notes by Abbie Betinis

In 1922, Rev. Bates G. Burt, a self-taught musician, began composing original Christmas carols and sending them as annual greeting cards to his friends, family, and parishioners. In 1942, he passed the job of composing the music to his son, Alfred Burt, a jazz trumpeter and young composer fresh out of the University of Michigan. The father-son team produced five carols together before Bates's death, and Alfred Burt went on to write a total of fifteen Christmas carols, including the popular *Caroling*, *Carolina*, and *Some Children See Him*.

Rev. Burt's great-granddaughter, Abbie Burt Betinis, has been continuing the family tradition since 2001. Each of her new carols premieres on Minnesota Public Radio, then, just like her great-grandfather Bates and great uncle Al, she sends it as a greeting card to her friends and family. *Prayer for Peace* is inspired by many of the Christmas sermons and public addresses Abbie's great-grandfather, Rev. Bates G. Burt, delivered during World War II. The eloquent minister's speeches were written so poetically that Abbie was able to extract whole phrases from them, around which she carefully constructed new lyrics.
