Exploring the Crossroads of Faith and Science


Reconciling God and Science in the 21st Century

In the fall of 2023, Countryside had the privilege of hosting a thought-provoking and intellectually stimulating adult educational series, <u>Reconciling</u>. <u>God and Science in the 21st Century</u>.

This series was led by co-teachers Rev. Dr. Don Sarton and Dr. John Windle. Rev. Sarton worked with Windle on developing the insightful 8-week program that delves into the intersection of Christianity and modern science.

If you couldn't attend the original sessions or are looking for intellectually and spiritually enriching content, read on! The series recap below presents a series that promises to challenge your perspectives and deepen your understanding of the intricate relationship between faith and science. Reconciling God and Science provides a contemporary, scientific lens through which to view God.

Rev. Sarton and Dr. Windle, a cardiac electrophysiologist and director of the Center for Intelligent Health Care at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, collaborated to explore how our evolving brains and ancient wisdom shape our



comprehension of God in the 21st century. Rev. Sarton's presentations looked at traditional words of Christianity and reclaiming/reframing them in terms of current scholarship, both in the fields of science and current thinking in theology/Biblical Scholarship.

The series sought to establish an authentic foundation for faith journeys. Participants were encouraged to question traditional interpretations that may conflict with the teachings and life of Jesus. All eight episodes are available on-demand and can be watched in any order. (INLCUDE LINK)

Week 1: Introduction to Reframing Significant Words of Christianity and God and Science

The series began by setting the stage, reframing key words and concepts in Christianity through a modern scientific viewpoint. This laid the foundation for the subsequent discussions.

Week 2: Sin and Salvation

Week 3: Sacrifice and Crucifixion

Week 4: Resurrection

The hosts courageously navigated through challenging topics such as sin, salvation, sacrifice, crucifixion, and resurrection. The goal was to evaluate traditional terms and present a progressive understanding that aligns with both science and spirituality.

Week 5: God is Dead - The Post-Modern Perspective; Reconciling God and Science in the 21st Century Delving into post-modern perspectives, the series explored the concept of 'God is Dead' and its implications in today's world. This session encouraged participants to reflect on evolving theological landscapes.

Week 6: Human - What Science Teaches Us About Being Human

This episode discussed what science teaches us about being human, aiming to bridge the gap between scientific discoveries and our spiritual understanding of humanity.

Week 7: Culture of Right and Wrong; Artificial Intelligence and Human Consequences
Examining cultural norms and the ethical implications of artificial intelligence, the series brought attention to the complex interplay between our values and technological advancements.

Week 8: An Integrating Summation
The series concluded with an integrating summation, providing participants with a cohesive understanding of the crossroads of faith and science.

One of the series' strengths was its acknowledgment of historical interpretations in Christianity, recognizing that many theological perspectives emerged in the politics of the 11th to 13th centuries. By understanding this history, participants gained valuable insights into key biblical lessons.

We encourage you to explore this on-demand, enlightening series. In a world where diverse theological perspectives exist, this series provided a safe space for exploration, dialogue and the building of a foundation that aligns with our evolving understanding of God and science.







Racial Justice Book Group Review

Caste, Isabel Wilkerson Review by Marcia Blum

Isabel Wilkerson incorporates strong historical research with stories about the lives of people that bring the facts to life. She describes



the creation of a caste system in the United States, placing white Europeans at the upper caste and Blacks as the lowest class, likening this to the caste systems in India and Germany. She outlines the ongoing justification for withholding freedom from the Blacks using laws, intimidation and violence to maintain the rights of the upper caste. She describes how this allowed power and money to be held by the upper white class by enslaving Black Africans as property and free labor with no rights.

The book gives examples of the many opportunities during the evolution of the United States where choices could have led to different and more humane and equal treatment for all. Following emancipation came other ways to keep the lower caste down, including the Jim Crow laws and the unequal war on drugs and the growing prison system.

With our eyes more open, we become aware of the ongoing inequities that can be changed. I will always remember a story about a young Black girl from the United States who won a contest asking what would be a just punishment for Hitler. Her response was, "Have him be a Black person in the United States."

Social groups meet for the sheer joy of connecting with friends old and new. Some gather at the same location each week, like Fellowship Arts and Music Etc. This group meets each Friday in Rahab for – you guessed it – activities that revolve around arts and music. Others, like the Lunch Bunch, meet once a month at various venues. A devoted small group of young Dungeons and Dragons aficionados meets each Friday evening for gameplay. On Sundays, a small group of junior high school students meets just for the joy of fun and games!

Journey Groups meet weekly to discuss and discover what our Still-speaking God calls us to do in our lives, community, and the world. In the process, we form deep relationships offering support to one another through life's journey. Journey Groups meet in person, although some groups offer a hybrid Zoom option. Journey Groups are always being formed. If you're interested in joining a Journey Group, contact the church office.

Study & Interest groups meet to expand their horizons on specific or narrow topics of interest. Some move beyond deepening their understanding and awareness to become involved in the greater community. Some of the existing purpose-driven groups that meet in person include the Sunday Morning Racial Justice Book Group, Banned Book Lovers Group (third Monday of each month), and Banned Books Small Group (Tuesdays at 6:30). Race in America, a weekly Wednesday night group, meets on Zoom only. Phoenix Affirmations groups delve into the 12 principles that guide Progressive

Christianity. There's even a new poetry-focused group!

Bible Study groups focus on developing and deepening our understanding of what it means to be a Christian in today's world. Some meet on a regular schedule, others for a specific period of time. Rev. Don Sarton's extremely popular Bible Study group's most recent series was Understanding Our Roots. The study focused on Luke's work organizing the many oral and written accounts of Jesus.

Educational small groups, like Adult Forum, meet to hear about and discuss various topics of interest. This group meets each Sunday after church service. Its most recent series focused on the history of world economics. Some small group opportunities are less structured. For example, the Impact Speaker program brings in outside experts on trending and important topics, like the impact of immigration on Nebraska's economy. Impact Speakers are presented on Recharge Wednesdays.

Volunteer Opportunities

Countryside has so many events and programs that offer volunteer opportunities, including office staffing, the Hope Garden, Countryside Pantry and special events such as baking for and assisting at funerals, the Ice Cream Festival, United We Walk, and Pride Parade. 
