FIRST LESSON: Psalm 25:1-10

To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul. O my God, in you I trust; do not let me be put to shame; do not let my enemies exult over me. Do not let those who wait for you be put to shame; let them be ashamed who are wantonly treacherous. Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. Lead me in your truth, and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; for you I wait all day long.

SECOND LESSON: Luke 5:1-11

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

MUSIC NOTES:

An aspect of our Lenten worship series is a week-by-week examination of lyrics from the hymn *Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing*, particularly the second line "tune my heart to sing thy grace." C4 choir will lead us into the series with an anthem, *Tune My Heart*, which takes the text and sets it to a different melody. We will sing the hymn with its typical melody at the end of the series but will have the words in the bulletin each week to guide us through the season. The text was written by eighteenth-century English hymn writer Robert Robinson, whose life experiences shape the text. One particular example cited by hymnologist Kenneth Osbeck, is that when his mother sent him to London to be an apprentice, he used his gap years to join a "notorious gang of hoodlums" and live "a debauched life" until he heard a sermon of the famous preacher George Whitefield. Despite no formal education, Robinson ultimately rose to great prominence as a preacher in his early twenties, and penning the hymn at age 22.

Some definitions for unfamiliar words and phrases in our musical texts this morning:

Though our hymnal rephrased the second verse, the phrase *Here I raise mine Ebenezer* appears in *Tune My Heart*. Ebenezer refers to the "Stone of Help," a reference to 1 Samuel 7:12: "Then Samuel took a stone and set it up between Mizpah and Jeshanah, and named it Ebenezer; for he said, 'Thus far the Lord has helped us.'"

In the hymn You Walk Along Our Shoreline, the first verse contains the line "And if you still will follow through storm and wave and shoal." There are two definitions of Shoal - one of which is a large group of fish and the other of which is a an area of shallow water that is a navigational hazard, such as a sandbar. The hymnwriter isn't on record as to which she had in mind, so choose your own adventure.

Come, thou Fount of every blessing, tune my heart to sing thy grace; streams of mercy, never ceasing, call for songs of loudest praise.Teach me some melodious sonnet, sung by flaming tongues above.Praise the mount! I'm fixed upon it, mount of thy redeeming love.

Here I raise to thee an altar; hither by thy help I've come; and I hope, by thy good pleasure, safely to arrive at home. Jesus sought me when a stranger, wandering from the fold of God; he, to rescue me from danger, interposed his precious blood.

O to grace how great a debtor daily I'm constrained to be! Let thy goodness, like a fetter, bind my wandering heart to thee. Prone to wander, how I feel it, prone to leave the God I love; here's my heart, O take and seal it, seal it for thy courts above.
