**Search and Subscribe:** Once you have downloaded a podcast app, you can search for the podcasts by typing in their names ("The Lever Time" or "Ezra Klein") in the search bar. Once you find the podcasts, you can subscribe to them. Subscribing ensures that new episodes are automatically downloaded or added to your library when they are released.

**Direct Links:** If you prefer to listen on a computer or directly through a browser, many podcasts also have websites where you can stream episodes. You can visit the websites for "The Lever Time" or "Ezra Klein" and find links to individual episodes.

**RSS Feeds:** Some podcast apps allow you to manually add podcasts using their RSS feeds. If you have the RSS feed URLs for "The Lever Time" or "Ezra Klein," you can paste them into your podcast app to subscribe.

be able to see all programs and events you are registered for, including Sunday worship. Instead of writing down each of your family members name on the pew sheet, just open the app to check in you and your family with a simple few taps. The check-in function is also available to groups that meet regularly, like book clubs, boards and social groups. Checking in on the app can also be a great way for Countryside members to keep track of attendance in the groups they lead. It can also reduce paper waste.

Speaking of checking in to Sunday worship services, did you know Countryside streams worship services online every Sunday? Now you can access those services and past services through the app!

The live worship page takes you directly to Countryside's YouTube page where all Countryside services are hosted. If you can't be at service in person, tune in to a live Sunday service live through the app.

In case you missed one, the Countryside YouTube channel also hosts all previously recorded services.



#### Support through your app!

If you or someone you know needs pastoral care or support, you can submit a request through the app. You can also submit an anonymous prayer request.

The new app is a great way to keep up to date on what is happening at Countryside and to help keep you connected not only on Sunday but also throughout the week.



#### The Fire Next Time

By James Baldwin Review by Jeri Lundblad

Baldwin was born in Harlem in 1924, and he died an ex-pat in France, in 1987. He published essays, novels, poems, plays, and non-fiction books in his prolific lifetime. This book is a work of non-fiction and autobiographical. He was a gay Black man who eloquently discussed




issues of prejudice, discrimination, religion, politics, economics, and sexuality.

He has completed in-depth examination about issues of his day with only a high school education. His works stand the test of time, accruing even greater relevance with our current injustice and discrimination with racial and LGBTQ+ issues. In his words, "God gave Noah the rainbow sign, No more water, the fire next time!"

## The New Jim Crow: Mass Incareration in the Age of Colorblindness

Alexander, a highly acclaimed civil rights lawyer, advocate, and legal scholar, argues that mass incarceration is "a stunningly comprehensive and well-disguised system of racialized social control that functions in a manner strikingly similar to Jim Crow."



Through each chapter, she demonstrates how race is used to victimized people of color through a complexity of ways, including racial profiling, biased sentencing policies, political disenfranchisement, and legalized employment discrimination that "trap African Americans in a virtual (and literal) cage."

The Antiracist Designation Committee would like to thank the many congregants who participated last year in our all-church book read. This year we suggest two books for individuals and journey groups to read April-May. The first is The Sum of Us: What Racism Costs Everyone and How We can Prosper Together from Heather McGhee. In this timely book, "McGhee marshals economic and sociological research to tell an irrefutable story of racism's costs, but at the heart of the book are the humble stories of people yearning to be part of a better America including white supremacy's collateral victims: white people themselves."

The second book we recommend is *How the Word is Passed*: A *Reckoning with the History of Slavery Across America* by Clint Smith. This author was the keynote speaker last year at the Tri-Faith's Race, Religion, and Social Justice Conference. This book takes the reader on a tour across America and describes in poetic detail the historic context and significance of the various sights.

## **Book Reviews**

**The Sum of Us**, Heather McGhee Review by Deb McCollister

Policy researcher Heather McGhee presents compelling stories illustrating why our nation's economic health is NOT a pie: "if you get a slice, there will be less for me." She debunks the myth that our economy is a zero-sum game, the idea that progress for some of us always comes at the expense of others.

McGhee asks why the U.S. lags so far behind other developed countries when it comes to public goods (like infrastructure, healthcare, and public education) and quality of life (including wages, life expectancy, and violence). Us vs. Them thinking may be our default view of the world.

### The Color of Compromise: The Truth About the American Church's Complicity in Racism, Jemar Tisby

Review by Sharon Royers

Tisby succinctly summarizes our nation's history of racism with an emphasis on the role of the white Christian church: "The refusal to act in the midst of injustice is itself an act of injustice. Indifference to oppression perpetuates oppression." He concludes the book with a call to action, with doable, practical action steps that we, the white Christian Church, can take to counter present-day systemic racism. This book opened my eyes to the church's role in perpetuating slavery, Jim Crow laws, and continued systemic racism in our country. Just as Jesus saw injustices and oppression of his day, and took action, he calls his followers to do so today.

Social groups meet for the sheer joy of connecting with friends old and new. Some gather at the same location each week, like Fellowship Arts and Music Etc. This group meets each Friday in Rahab for – you guessed it – activities that revolve around arts and music. Others, like the Lunch Bunch, meet once a month at various venues. A devoted small group of young Dungeons and Dragons aficionados meets each Friday evening for gameplay. On Sundays, a small group of junior high school students meets just for the joy of fun and games!

Journey Groups meet weekly to discuss and discover what our Still-speaking God calls us to do in our lives, community, and the world. In the process, we form deep relationships offering support to one another through life's journey. Journey Groups meet in person, although some groups offer a hybrid Zoom option. Journey Groups are always being formed. If you're interested in joining a Journey Group, contact the church office.

Study & Interest groups meet to expand their horizons on specific or narrow topics of interest. Some move beyond deepening their understanding and awareness to become involved in the greater community. Some of the existing purpose-driven groups that meet in person include the Sunday Morning Racial Justice Book Group, Banned Book Lovers Group (third Monday of each month), and Banned Books Small Group (Tuesdays at 6:30). Race in America, a weekly Wednesday night group, meets on Zoom only. Phoenix Affirmations groups delve into the 12 principles that guide Progressive

Christianity. There's even a new poetry-focused group!

Bible Study groups focus on developing and deepening our understanding of what it means to be a Christian in today's world. Some meet on a regular schedule, others for a specific period of time. Rev. Don Sarton's extremely popular Bible Study group's most recent series was Understanding Our Roots. The study focused on Luke's work organizing the many oral and written accounts of Jesus.

Educational small groups, like Adult Forum, meet to hear about and discuss various topics of interest. This group meets each Sunday after church service. Its most recent series focused on the history of world economics. Some small group opportunities are less structured. For example, the Impact Speaker program brings in outside experts on trending and important topics, like the impact of immigration on Nebraska's economy. Impact Speakers are presented on Recharge Wednesdays.

#### **Volunteer Opportunities**

Countryside has so many events and programs that offer volunteer opportunities, including office staffing, the Hope Garden, Countryside Pantry and special events such as baking for and assisting at funerals, the Ice Cream Festival, United We Walk, and Pride Parade.
