Items of need include personal care products for all skin/hair types, feminine products, fast food cards and bus passes.



In her sermon on August 11, Rev. Jenny shared some insights from New York Times columnist David Brooks, particularly from his latest book, *How to Know a Person:* The Art of Seeing Others Deeply and Being Deeply Seen.

"Brooks reminds us that true community is about being deeply intertwined with others in a way that fosters a shared moral culture—a culture where we all feel responsible for each other and the common good," she said. "This is exactly the kind of community we want to build at Countryside, one that reflects Christ's commandment to love our neighbors as ourselves."

UCC General Minister and President Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia A. Thompson

Historic UCC leader to deliver sermon on September 29





United Church of Christ (UCC) General Minister and President Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia A. Thompson will provide our sermon on Sunday, Sept. 29, following the Joint Annual Meeting here Sept. 27-28.

"We are deeply honored to welcome Rev. Dr. Thompson to our pulpit. Her groundbreaking leadership and tireless dedication to justice and equity serve as an inspiration to us all," said Rev. Dr. Jenny Shultz-Thomas. "Her presence reminds us of the transformative power of faith and the importance of inclusive leadership in the church and beyond."

Rev. Thompson is the first woman and first woman of African descent to serve as leader of the denomination. Prior to this call, Rev. Thompson served in the national setting of the UCC for 14 years - two years as Minister for Racial Justice, eight years as Minister for Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations and four years as the Associate General Minister (AGM) for Wider Church Ministries and Co-Executive for Global Ministries. She was elected as AGM in 2019. Her passion

for justice and equity moved her work on behalf of the UCC as Pastor and on the Conference staff as the Minister for into a global context, affording the opportunity to participate globally in efforts to reduce the marginalization experienced by African descendant peoples and other communities globally.

Before joining the national staff, Rev. Thompson served in the Florida Conference United Church of Christ as Pastor and on the Conference staff as the Minister for Disaster Response and Recovery. She also worked in the nonprofit arena for over 10 years in senior leaderships positions.

Disaster Response and Recovery. She also worked in the nonprofit arena for over 10 years in senior leaderships positions.

Rev. Thompson earned a bachelor of arts from Brooklyn College in New York, a master's in public administration from North Carolina Central University in Durham, NC, and a masters of divinity from Union Theological Seminary in New York. She also studied public policy at Duke University and earned her Doctorate in Ministry at Seattle University. She was awarded an honorary doctorate from Heidelberg University.

Neighborhood Partnerships. The New York Times bestselling author has written 13 books, including 2024's <u>The False White Gospel: Rejecting Christian Nationalism, Reclaiming True Faith, and Refounding Democracy</u>, and

Why the Right Gets it Wrong and the Left Doesn't Get It, and hosts the popular podcast, The Soul of the Nation.

In 2022, Washingtonian magazine named Wallis one of the 500 most influential people shaping policy in DC.

Wallis and Lewis will be joined on Saturday's panel discussion by Dr. Samuel L. Perry, the Sam K. Viersen Presidential Professor of Sociology at the University of Oklahoma. His current research examines how contemporary technological and demographic transformations



are shaping American religion and its relationship to politics and race relations. Perry has written more than 120 peer-reviewed journal articles; is the author or co-author of five books, including the award-winning *Taking America Back for God and* his most recent, *Religion for Realists: Why We All Need the Scientific Study of Religion;* and has written for the Washington Post, NBC News, Dallas Morning News and TIME Magazine. His work has also been featured in docuseries by Al Jazeera, Frontline and in *BAD FAITH: Christian Nationalism's Unholy War on Democracy*.

Nebraska native Dr. Lucas L. Schulte is a scholar and educator with more than a decade of experience teaching at institutions including Pomona College, Eden Theological Seminary, Claremont School of Theology and his alma mater, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He holds a PhD in Religion from Claremont Graduate University, where he studied under world-renowned scholars of Hebrew Bible, Second Temple Judaism, and Zoroastrianism. He also holds a master's degree from Yale Divinity School. Luke's scholarship has led to several significant publications, including a peer-reviewed scholarly book that examines history, archaeology and ancient inscriptions from the Persian Period and a chapter in the forthcoming book titled Isaiah in the Persian Period.

He's also helped edit three volumes on the Dead Sea Scrolls (Book 1 and Book 2) and one book on Zoroastrianism. He's most excited to invite the wider Tri-Faith community to his latest course, The 'Other' Doing God's Work: Exploring the Interfaith Crossroads of the Ancient Middle East" - five free sessions on a formative period in the Abrahamic religions with surprising

Leveraging fascinating content about the Persian period and new knowledge that Schulte has contributed to the field throughout his career, this five-session course aims to move audiences beyond limiting misconceptions (ex: "The Middle East has always been embroiled in bloody religious conflict") and offer them a fresh perspective on a critical, transformative period for Judaism — and later, a pivotal point of reflection for Christianity and Islam. When we discover that the interfaith relations of the past were far more interesting and experimental than we thought, we tend to approach the perceived limitations of the present with renewed hope! Attending all five sessions consecutively is recommended, but each session is a standalone learning experience.

The Importance of Small Groups in Church Life

Small groups are the lifeblood of a church community. They offer a space for deeper connections, personal growth, and spiritual nourishment that isn't always possible in larger gatherings. In a small group, relationships flourish as people share their stories, support one another, and walk together in their faith journeys. These groups create a sense of belonging, providing a safe space to explore questions, celebrate joys, and face challenges with the love and support of others.

Being part of a small group also helps us live out the teachings of Christ in a tangible way. As we gather in these smaller communities, we learn to love our neighbors more fully, practicing forgiveness, compassion and service in our daily lives. Small groups are where real transformation happens—both individually and collectively—leading to a stronger, more unified church community.

Introducing Our Village Houses (Small Groups)

Our Village Houses are named after traditional roles in a

village, such as Elders, Water Keepers and Guardians. These groups are designed to be fun, meaningful and intergenerational, providing a space where we can connect and belong.

We're also planning a range of village-wide activities and practices, like yoga, walking Abraham's Bridge, attending theatre outings, two-way prayer or queer potluck, and making music together. There's truly something for everyone!

We're also looking for facilitators to help lead these Village Houses. Don't worry, you won't be doing it alone—each group will have co-facilitators, so you can team up with a friend. Our initial sessions will focus on Brooks' book, running from September 18 to November 6, with meetings on Wednesdays at 6 p.m. at the church. After that, each group can decide on a meeting schedule that works best for them.

We can't wait to embark on this journey together and start building a community that truly reflects the love of God. Let's begin this journey of connection together.
