SECOND LESSON: Luke 10:25-37

An expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

But wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. October and November are the months of Countryside's focus on Disability Awareness. What Have We Accomplished?

We've taken important first steps toward creating an environment that aligns with the varied needs of our congregants and visitors. Some of our tangible accomplishments include the creation of an Accessibility Center in the Narthex, the installation of handicap-accessible restroom doors, vision enhancements, and safety features around our campus. However, we recognize that more significant projects, such as large-scale enhancements and remodeling, are still ahead.

Guest Preacher Rev. Jim Wallis

Rev. Jim Wallis is a prominent theologian, social justice advocate and thought leader whose work has long connected faith with public engagement. He is the founder of Sojourners, an international network of Christians committed to social justice, peacemaking, and environmental stewardship. His visionary leadership has positioned him as a trusted

Currently, Rev. Wallis is the inaugural Chair in Faith and Justice at Georgetown University's McCourt School of Public Policy, where he directs the Center on Faith and Justice. In this role, he fosters dialogue on the role of faith in addressing pressing social challenges and encourages future leaders to engage with the moral and ethical dimensions of public policy.

voice on the intersection of religion and politics, as well as a leading figure in the fight for justice and reconciliation in America and beyond.

Rev. Wallis has spent decades advocating for a faith that moves beyond the confines of individual piety to address the systemic challenges of poverty, racism, and inequality. As a public theologian, his work has been instrumental in reshaping how Christians, particularly evangelicals, engage with political issues. He has served as a spiritual advisor to national leaders, including President Obama, and has participated in numerous initiatives aimed at bridging divides across racial, economic and ideological lines. Wallis is a frequent commentator on ethics and policy, and his work has appeared in publications ranging from *The New York Times* to *TIME* magazine.

Rev. Wallis is also a bestselling author. His books, including God's Politics: Why the Right Gets It Wrong and the Left Doesn't Get It and America's Original Sin: Racism, White Privilege, and the Bridge to a New America, have helped mobilize communities of faith to become agents of social change. His latest work, The False White Gospel, challenges harmful narratives within Christianity that perpetuate division and injustice, urging believers to reclaim the true essence of the Gospel message.

Rev. Wallis today will present *Who is My Neighbor?*, and lead a sermon talkback after the service, offering an opportunity for deeper discussion and reflection. Join us as we engage with Rev. Wallis's insights on how we can collectively work towards a more just and compassionate world.
