

As Advent comes again to a weary world, we ask, How does a weary world rejoice? Christ was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming. Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people.

So, how does a weary world rejoice? From the opening chapters of Luke's Gospel, we have found a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. In the parallel birth stories of Jesus and John, joy arrives—despite trepidation, fear or grief. In these stories, we find rhythms for rejoicing. As we

move through the Advent season, we hope to create space for acknowledging the weariness of our world while celebrating God's closeness with great joy.

#### How Does a Weary World Rejoice?

This Advent, we'll hold space for our weariness and our joy. We'll seek a "thrill of hope" in our hurting world. We'll welcome joy—even if, like the prophet Isaiah, we cry out for comfort (Isaiah 40:1). In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice. The 2024 Devotional, How Does a Weary World Rejoice? follows the Christmas story in Luke 1–2, concluding with Baptism of the Lord Sunday. It includes weekly readings to follow at your own pace. ## **EPS Recycling**



Just in time for the holidays, Countryside will have a collection site for heavy, Expandable Polystyrene (EPS) packing material. EPS is the hard white packaging foam used to transport goods like TVs, appliances, glass items, temperature-sensitive medications and perishables. There's bound to be a lot of it during the gift-giving season. Give it another life by sending it to Plastilite.

The collection site will be on the lower level near the south double doors. Drop-off times are 8-4 Mon-Fri. Access the green bag container by ringing a buzzer from the outdoor entrance or by going through the main upper-level doors. Please don't drop off tape, labels, flexible foam, food containers, packing peanuts or foam sheets. The collection site will be open from December 15, 2024, through Jan. 12, 2025. Be environmentally friendly and recycle your EPS!
