Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. And now do not be distressed or angry with yourselves because you sold me here, for God sent me before you to preserve life. For the famine has been in the land these two years, and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt. Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, 'Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me; do not delay. SECOND LESSON: Luke 6:27-38

"But I say to you who are listening: Love your enemies; do good to those who hate you; bless those who curse you; pray for those who mistreat you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also, and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who asks of you, and if anyone takes away what is yours, do not ask for it back again. Do to others as you would have them do to you.



Our Church by the Numbers

At the Annual Meeting on February 9, the congregation approved an operating budget of \$1,605,582 for the 2025 calendar year. Each month, after the Finance and Operations Board reviews the previous months Treasurer's report, this space will be used to provide the congregation and update of where we are monthly to the budget and overall. For the month of January, revenue is slightly above budget and expenses are slightly below budget.

There will also be monthly spotlights on how the budget is funded and where the money is used. This month let's look at the revenue side of the budget. 70% of the revenue comes from member donations and 4% from facility usage fees/dividends/ Interest. Additional sources needed to balance the budget include: 6% from realized/unrealized gains, 5% from estate gifts/designated funds, 1% Capital Fund and 7% general reserves. The Stewardship Committee continues their efforts to increase the member giving reducing the need for additional sources.




Welcome, Rev. Roberto Ochoa
