We are committed to building a more inclusive and equitable society, and our ongoing antiracism work helps us live out these values.


Looking for a way to observe Martin Luther King Jr. Day? Consider one of these community events on Monday, Jan. 20:

The drop-off stie for hard (EPS) Styrofoam is open through January 12. EPS is the hard white packaging foam used to transport goods like TVs, appliances, glass items and perishables. There's bound to have been a lot of it during the gift-giving season. Give it another life by sending it to Plastilite.

The collection site will be on the lower level near the south double doors. Drop-off times are 8–4 Mon–Fri. Access the green bag container by ringing a buzzer from the outdoor entrance or by going through the main upper-level doors.
