

## Walking the Sacred Path: The History and Significance of Labyrinths

Labyrinths have been used for centuries as a tool for reflection, prayer, and spiritual journeying. Unlike a maze, which is designed to confuse with multiple paths and dead ends, a labyrinth offers a single, winding path leading to the center and back out again. This simple yet profound design invites those who walk it to slow down, center themselves, and experience a deeper connection to God.

Historically, labyrinths date back over 4,000 years and have appeared in various cultures and spiritual traditions. The earliest known labyrinth designs can be found in ancient petroglyphs and on pottery from regions as diverse as Greece, India, and Scandinavia. In the Christian tradition, labyrinths became especially prominent during the medieval period. The most famous example is the labyrinth at Chartres Cathedral in France, built in the early 13th century. Pilgrims who could not journey to Jerusalem would walk the labyrinth as a symbolic pilgrimage, meditating as they moved toward the center, representing spiritual enlightenment or closeness to God.

Today, labyrinths are used by churches, retreat centers, and individuals seeking a contemplative practice. Walking a labyrinth during Lent can be particularly meaningful, as it mirrors the inward journey of reflection, repentance, and renewal. As we step onto the path, we are invited to let go of distractions, listen for God's guidance, and prepare our hearts for the transformative power of Easter.

This Lent, as you walk the Countryside labyrinth, take time to embrace its sacred rhythm. Trust the journey, knowing that each step brings you closer to God's presence and the hope of resurrection.





#### How to Walk a Labyrinth

Walking a labyrinth is a personal and spiritual practice, meant to quiet the mind and open the heart. Here are some simple steps to guide your walk:

**Prepare Your Heart** – Before stepping onto the path, take a deep breath, set an intention, or offer a silent prayer.

Walk with Awareness – Follow the winding path slowly and mindfully, letting go of distractions and focusing on each step.

**Reach the Center** – Pause in the center for reflection, prayer, or simply to rest in God's presence.

**Return with Gratitude** – Walk the path back out with a sense of renewal, carrying the peace and insight you've gained.

There is no right or wrong way to walk a labyrinth. Come as you are, trust the journey, and let the experience unfold.

## Faith in Every Furrow: Where Service and Soil Meet

What happens when you mix soil, service, and a dedicated community? You get the Tri-Faith Gardens—the Unity Garden and Hope Orchard—where fresh produce and friendships grow side by side. Since its start in 2019 as a Temple Israel Social Justice Committee project, the garden has provided healthy food to food-insecure families across Omaha.

#### 2024: Challenges, Wins, and Community Spirit

This year, volunteers gave more than **2,600 hours** of labor to improve the gardens—restructuring beds, enhancing composting, and refining irrigation. Their work supported food pantries like the UNO MAV Student Pantry, Intercultural Senior Center, Countryside Cupboard, and Clair Cares.

Major highlights? The **5,840 pounds** of vegetables donated to the pantries, and a whopping **137 volunteers**, from students to faith communities, proving that food isn't the only thing flourishing—so is a spirit of service and connection.

#### What's Ahead for 2025?

Big things are growing! The garden will be featured in the <u>Munroe Meyer Guild Garden Walk</u>, June 8, and included in Ellie Pierce's new documentary, **A Bridge**. Plus, an exciting new partnership with **Rise** 



aims to provide opportunities for individuals reentering the community after incarceration.

Sustainability is also in focus, with expanded composting, cover crop planting, and organic methods leading the charge. Thanks to dedicated volunteers and generous donors, 2025 is set to be a fruitful year—literally and figuratively.

## UNO's Studies Lecture to Feature Tri-Faith's Schulte

In this insightful lecture, Dr. Schulte will explore how Persian kings, through Babylonian and Egyptian inscriptions, assumed the religious roles of local kings. He will also examine how Deutero-Isaiah reinterprets this Persian Royal Propaganda Model to fit the religious context of Judean exiles. This fascinating topic sheds light on the intersection of religion, power, and scribal traditions during the Achaemenid Empire.
